

Protecting Primates in Tanzania

Rainforest Trust and our local partner, Tanzania Forest Conservation Group (TFCG), in collaboration with a consortium of stakeholders, created the 6,463-acre Magombera Nature Reserve Forest. The Magombera Forest Reserve will lay the foundations for a crucial wildlife corridor between two of Tanzania's largest protected areas, while making an important contribution to the long-term protection of the Vulnerable Udzungwa Red Colobus Monkey. Additionally, Rainforest Trust and TFCG purchased a 9-acre property near the Magombera Forest Reserve to turn the site into a new botanical garden. The new botanical garden aims to use native plant species for education, research and conservation. In particular, TFCG hopes the property can be a seed bank for plant species at risk of going extinct in the wild.



Expanded Protection for Ghana's Rainforest

In 2018, we teamed up with our local partner, Herp Conservation Ghana, to establish the 847-acre Onepone Endangered Species Refuge. To increase protection, our two organizations recently completed a 1,285-acre expansion of the reserve, which now totals 2,132 acres of critical rainforest habitat. The Critically Endangered Togo Slippery Frog now has a fighting chance to survive.



A First in South Sudan

Working with our partner Fauna and Flora International, Rainforest Trust helped to create a protected area in Africa's youngest country, South Sudan. The new 42,323-acre Bangangai Game Reserve safeguards the last significant swath of intact lowland forest in the country. Globally important populations of some of the world's most unique mammals will find safety in the Bangangai Game Reserve, including Endangered Chimpanzees, Forest Elephants, Leopards, Giant Ground Pangolins and White-bellied Pangolins.
